Looking to the Future

Community Greenhouse and Gardens

April 2013 saw CLQW take over the management of the Quinte West Greenhouse and Gardens. This program grows produce to supply community programs that assist low income people to enjoy fresh vegetable, such as the food bank, Meals on Wheels, the soup kitchen and various group homes. Our goal is to expand this program to include more seniors, nursing homes, and church groups.

PawsActive Doggie Daycare

This program has outgrown the premises at 11 Canal Street and has moved to 52 Lafferty Road. The country setting is more suitable for the expansion of the day care and grooming services. A future goal of this program is to include kenneling.

Health Energy Learning Motivation thru Sports

HELMS has received a grant from the Government of Ontario to expand the region of service. The program will be serving an area that stretches from Kingston in the east, Bancroft and Peterborough in the north, Kawartha Lakes and Port Hope in the west, and south to Picton. This expansion will provide many more individuals opportunities to experience community sports programs.

Compass

Music is a unique way to learn. The Compass program is looking to develop a full music program which will enhance the learning opportunities for those who attend the program.

Transformation That Does Not Transform

The Developmental sector has been undergoing what is termed transformation for several years. During this Ministry of Community and Social Services' process we have experienced the implementation of Developmental Service Ontario, Quality Assurance Measures, cuts to funding, confusion in the guidelines surrounding the move from Special Services at Home to Passport funding, a profusion of "data collection" initiatives which have added to the work of agencies already overburdened with Ministry directives as well as a continuing muddle and misunderstanding between MCSS and the Ministry of Health in obtaining services for people with dual diagnosis. In addition the breach between the Ministry of Children and Youth and the Ministry of Community and Social Services is crippling smooth transitions for young people with a developmental disability.

This litany of negative situations affecting the developmental service sector is being investigated by the Ombudsman Office and in the fall a report is expected which will perhaps shed light on what is happening in the DS sector. Most of the concerns above could be addressed if MCSS were willing to collaborate in an effective manner with those of us who provide services. The Provincial Network, the Provincial Executive Director's Group, OASIS and Community Living Ontario are all sources of information and ideas that could help craft strategies that would take into consideration the realities parents and agencies live within. Developmental Service Ontario waiting lists continue to swell; agencies continue to struggle to provide services and confusion continues for desperate parents as to what support and help they can expect. The time is now for the Ministry to open their transformation process and fit their changes to the needs of the people and families supported.

Our sector has reached out and asked for this kind of collaboration but with rare exceptions, agencies and parents are told what we are to do rather than asked what will help us. Leadership that is transformative is not solely directive but collaborative and inclusive if it is to be effective in making lasting change. How long will it take before we see a more collaborative effort on the part of MCSS as it attempts to transform this sector?


Fundraising





COMPASS

The Compass Program continues to provide opportunities for individuals to participate in their community in many ways, such as grocery shopping, going golfing, playing pool, going to the local YMCA, visiting the library, bowling, Elvis singing, arenas, local high school rugby and football games, taking a bus to the Casino, visiting museums, art centres, historical places, just to name a few. We also have increased the number of guest speakers we have coming into Compass to make presentations on topics such as music, nutrition, building bird houses. Every week we incorporate what is happening in the community and plan around these activities.

Compass participated in the 2nd Annual Quinte West Quest this year, searching for and finding 75 places in our area. Health Energy Learning Motivation thru Sports

The HELMS Program has just finished its fourth year of operation. The main purpose of this program is to access community sports programs in an inclusive manner for youth and adults with an intellectual disability. The program is designed to help individuals gain their highest potential of skills, with the intent of individuals continuing to pursue the sport outside of HELMS. The sports offered are determined by the individuals' interests with some dropped from one year to the next and new sports added.

In 2012-2013 CLQW had 55 more individual opportunities than last year. Individuals have been able to experience community sports activities such as sailing, lawn bowling, horseback riding, golfing, baseball, curling, skiing, sit skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing, cross country skiing, and everyone's favourite, dog sledding.

Over the course of the past year, the HELMS participants have been able to increase their overall health, fitness and skills levels. Individuals have stated that they feel better physically and emotionally after having participated in one of the community sports. This has encouraged them to continue to pursue a healthier lifestyle.
